NEW BUSINESS

- Habitat for Humanity West All Saints Project Update Derby Swanson, Community Impact Manager

 - o Habitat for Humanity of Frederick County purchased the 100 E All Sinta property from Asbury United in 2020. It is held as a community land trust, with the intention of developing 12 affordable condominium housing units on it.

- Habitat for Humanity retains ownership of that land. So when one of the families that
 moves into that condominium association sells the property which they're allowed to,
 Habitat for Humanity will be able to keep the units in that development affordable in
 perpetuity.
- The first phase is going to be six units and that will be using three red buildings that are standing now or barely standing. They will be reinforced and rehabbed.

 - O Document: Zoning Map Amendment Application for 220 N East
 - When a property undergoes outside of the historic district is reviewed for demolition, the Historic Preservation Commission receives the opportunity to determine whether the building has architectural, historic significance.
 - An application was recently submitted for a property at 220 North East Street, which was previously used as the Roads and Rails Museum
 - About the property:
 - Originally was a stone cutter and marble works building
 - Became a municipal electric plant in 1903
 - Acquired by Potomac Edison after 1943
 - The commission takes the following questions into account when reviewing historic properties:
 - Is this building historic?
 - Does it have value?
 - Can it tell its story?
 - The building will be reviewed at the next historic preservation commission on February
 They were decide whether or not to recommend moving this demolition process forward.
 - o Residents asked what the site would be replaced with. Essentially, what would be developed on that site?
 - The applicant clarified that they do not have plans for that site, but see it as an opportunistic location since it is a gravel parking lot between two garages. They have not requested demolition for the 'core historic' portion of the property, a 70 by 60 ft structure. They requested demolition for the ancillary portion. The next part of the process is to understand what makes sense for the community there in the context of form-based code.
 - A resident summarized the form-based code initiative to neighbors. The vision document for the east street corridor has been published and has a designated concept, block-byclock for the whole eastern corridor.
